What is Completed Staff Work (CSW)?

It's simple: Your job is to deliver solutions, not problems.

CSW means taking a problem, doing the research, and presenting a complete solution to your boss. When you're done, your boss only needs to say "approve" or "decline." No back-and-forth. No hand-holding. Just a finished product.

Why It Matters

The Rule of Thumb for Completed Staff Work

1. Solve, Don't Dump.

2. Don't Ask, 'What Should I Do?'

Asking for direction shifts the problem back to your boss. Instead, figure out what they'd want done and make it happen.

3. Collaborate Smartly.

Talk to peers. Seek advice. But when you present to your boss, it should be polished and complete.

4. Make It Boss-Ready.

Your work should be clear, concise, and ready to sign. No fluff. No jargon. If it's not something your boss can confidently approve, it's not done yet.

The Final Test

Before you deliver your work, ask yourself: "If I were the boss, would I sign this and bet my reputation on it?" If the answer is no, go back and fix it.

Why It Works

- It saves your boss time. They focus on big-picture decisions, not minor details.
- It builds trust. Your boss sees you as reliable, capable, and leadership material.
- It prepares you for the future. CSW is about solving challenges that push you closer to becoming a leader yourself.
